

Understanding the Million Dollar Emotion

Exodus 2:11-22 (NIV)

One day, after Moses had grown up, he went out to where his own people were and watched them at their hard labor. He saw an Egyptian beating a Hebrew, one of his own people. 12 Looking this way and that and seeing no one, he killed the Egyptian and hid him in the sand. 13 The next day he went out and saw two Hebrews fighting. He asked the one in the wrong, "Why are you hitting your fellow Hebrew?" 14 The man said, "Who made you ruler and judge over us? Are you thinking of killing me as you killed the Egyptian?" Then Moses was afraid and thought, "What I did must have become known." 15 When Pharaoh heard of this, he tried to kill Moses, but Moses fled from Pharaoh and went to live in Midian, where he sat down by a well. 16 Now a priest of Midian had seven daughters, and they came to draw water and fill the troughs to water their father's flock. 17 Some shepherds came along and drove them away, but Moses got up and came to their rescue and watered their flock. 18 When the girls returned to Reuel their father, he asked them, "Why have you returned so early today?" 19 They answered, "An Egyptian rescued us from the shepherds. He even drew water for us and watered the flock." 20 "And where is he?" Reuel asked his daughters. "Why did you leave him? Invite him to have something to eat." 21 Moses agreed to stay with the man, who gave his daughter Zipporah to Moses in marriage. 22 Zipporah gave birth to a son, and Moses named him Gershom, saying, "I have become a foreigner in a foreign land."

- 1. Righteous anger is a catalyst for change. (Hebrews 11:24-26; Isaiah 1:17)
 - Righteous anger is surgical anger focused on protecting the oppressed and exposing sin.

- What present evil are you currently angry about?
- 2. Unrighteous anger is a cause of destruction.
 - A. The cost of unrighteous anger:
 - Unrighteous anger is life's most expensive emotion. (Proverbs 12:18)
 - What is unrighteous anger costing me?
 - B. The cause of unrighteous anger: (James 4:1)
 - Unrighteous anger comes from loving the wrong things, or loving the right things out of proportion.

Anger is a powerful energy released in defense of something you love!

- The cause of Moses' anger stems from his desire to be God instead of trusting God.
- Control issues reveal themselves with either anxiety or anger!
- Where are you trying to be god instead of trusting God?
- C. The cure for unrighteous anger: (Romans 12:17-21)
 - I. Confess the source and don't confuse the source.
 - 2. Trust God and quit trying to be God! (Ephesians 4:26)
 - I am limited but God is unlimited.
 - 3. Deserts can be a launching pad not a dead end.
