UNDERSTANDING THE CONTEXT:

When does 1 and 2 Samuel take place?

Based upon the order of Scripture, following Judges in the Old Testament comes the book of 1 Samuel. Judges ends with stories of spiritual problems among the priests, misconduct of the people in other parts of Israel, that leads to the introduction of Eli as the priest that is spiritually dull to the things of God.

What is 1 and 2 Samuel about?

The story follows the interactions among three main characters:

Samuel: Early in the book of 1 Samuel, we are introduced to the miraculous birth and call of Samuel from a young man to be a judge for the Israelites. Rather than accepting the continued leadership of God through the men of God, the people desire to have a king. Samuel maintains his position as a spiritual leader for the children of Israel even with the arrival of the king.

Saul: Saul comes on the scene at first as a tall, shy young man that has no desire to be king. Yet eventually he embraces his role. Early in his life as a king, we can see moments of following the Lord's leadership, however, we begin to quickly see the compromises and jealousies that follow his life leading to his ultimate death in battle.

David: The young shepherd boy that is pronounced king steps from the flock to the fortress. His integrity and character shows early in his life as a servant in the kingdom, warrior, and eventual king set the stage for a very successful kingdom that promises to have a king on the throne forever from his lineage. However, as sin crept in, so do compromises as well that lead to the murdering of a faithful warrior. Yet through his story we can see the redemption and forgiveness of God.

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HOW TO USE THE READING PLAN:

Here is a basic guide of the week to week interactions with the reading plan.

Memory Verse Challenge:

Each week there is a memory verse related to the topic of Scripture discussed that week. Sometimes the verse may come directly from the reading plan, while other times it may relate to the topic. We are challenged to take God's Word and memorize it to our lives to encourage or correct us as needed.

Reading Plan Description:

There are three types of plans that you can participate in with daily reading as well as homework called "Digging in" depending on where you are in your season of life. Each plan takes into account a certain amount of time and challenge to help you grow spiritually. The reading plan is divided by each type of plan so you can follow the logos on the bottom of the page to know which level you are studying. Here is a brief description of each plan:



First Step Reading Plan is a three-day reading plan that covers specific parts of 1 and 2 Samuel with three days of "digging in" that asks questions of reflection and action of each person.

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Next Step Reading Plan is a five-day reading plan that covers specific parts of 1 and 2 Samuel with three days of "digging in" that encourages interaction with the text as far as discovery of themes and points of application using a method called HEAR (Highlight, Explain, Apply, Respond).

Growth Step Reading Plan is a daily reading plan with five days of "digging in" that covers the meaning of specific words and phrases that inform the overall theme of the text using the DART (Define, Answer, Reflect, Tell) method. Additional resources such as commentaries, dictionaries, or cross-reference tools (blueletterbible.org) are required for this part of the reading plan, but many are offered online for free. **Begins page 42**

FIRST STEP READING PLAN



Hebrews 9:15, **"For this reason Christ is the mediator of a new covenant, that those who** are called may receive the promised eternal inheritance..."

DAILY READING PLAN:

DIGGING IN:

Day 1: 1 Samuel 2:12-17

¹² Eli's sons were scoundrels; they had no regard for the Lord. ¹³ Now it was the practice of the priests that, whenever any of the people offered a sacrifice, the priest's servant would come with a three-pronged fork in his hand while the meat was being boiled ¹⁴ and would plunge the fork into the pan or kettle or caldron or pot. Whatever the fork brought up the priest would take for himself. This is how they treated all the Israelites who came to Shiloh. ¹⁵ But even before the fat was burned, the priest's servant would come and say to the person who was sacrificing, "Give the priest some meat to roast; he won't accept boiled meat from you, but only raw." ¹⁶ If the person said to him, "Let the fat be burned first, and then take whatever you want," the servant would answer, "No, hand it over now; if you don't, I'll take it by force." ¹⁷ This sin of the young men was very great in the Lord's sight, for they were treating the Lord's offering with contempt.

What is God saying in this passage to me?

*Why was God upset with Eli's sons? What are ways that we can show disregard or contempt toward the Lord?

Day 2: 1 Samuel 2:18-21

¹⁸ But Samuel was ministering before the Lord—a boy wearing a linen ephod. ¹⁹ Each year his mother made him a little robe and took it to him when she went up with her husband to offer the annual sacrifice. ²⁰ Eli would bless Elkanah and his wife, saying, "May the Lord give you children by this woman to take the place of the one she prayed for and gave to the Lord." Then they would go home. ²¹ And the Lord was gracious to Hannah; she gave birth to three sons and two daughters. Meanwhile, the boy Samuel grew up in the presence of the Lord.

What is God saying to me in this passage?

How can I live out what I have learned today?

*How was the Lord gracious to Hannah? Samuel? What impact does God's grace make in our lives?



Day 3: 1 Samuel 2: 22-25

²² Now Eli, who was very old, heard about everything his sons were doing to all Israel and how they slept with the women who served at the entrance to the tent of meeting. ²³ So he said to them, "Why do you do such things? I hear from all the people about these wicked deeds of yours. ²⁴ No, my sons; the report I hear spreading among the Lord's people is not good. ²⁵ If one person sins against another, God may mediate for the offender; but if anyone sins against the Lord, who will intercede for them?" His sons, however, did not listen to their father's rebuke, for it was the Lord's will to put them to death.

What is God saying to me in this passage?

How can I live out what I have learned today?

*What are examples of ways that we may not listen to God's rebuke? What consequences can that have in our relationships with others and with Christ?

DIGGING IN:

Day 1: 1 Samuel 18:1-4

After David had finished talking with Saul, Jonathan became one in spirit with David, and he loved him as himself. ² From that day Saul kept David with him and did not let him return home to his family. ³ And Jonathan made a covenant with David because he loved him as himself. ⁴ Jonathan took off the robe he was wearing and gave it to David, along with his tunic, and even his sword, his bow and his belt.

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How can I live out what I have learned today?

Day 2: 1 Samuel 18:5-8

⁵ Whatever mission Saul sent him on, David was so successful that Saul gave him a high rank in the army. This pleased all the troops, and Saul's officers as well.

⁶ When the men were returning home after David had killed the Philistine, the women came out from all the towns of Israel to meet King Saul with singing and dancing, with joyful songs and with timbrels and lyres. ⁷ As they danced, they sang:

"Saul has slain his thousands,

and David his tens of thousands."

⁸ Saul was very angry; this refrain displeased him greatly. "They have credited David with tens of thousands," he thought, "but me with only thousands. What more can he get but the kingdom?" ' And from that time on Saul kept a close eye on David.

What is God saying to me in this passage?

Day 3: 1 Samuel 18: 10-15

¹⁰ The next day an evil spirit from God came forcefully on Saul. He was prophesying in his house, while David was playing the lyre, as he usually did. Saul had a spear in his hand ¹¹ and he hurled it, saying to himself, "I'll pin David to the wall." But David eluded him twice.

¹² Saul was afraid of David, because the Lord was with David but had departed from Saul. ¹³ So he sent David away from him and gave him command over a thousand men, and David led the troops in their campaigns. ¹⁴ In everything he did he had great success, because the Lord was with him. ¹⁵ When Saul saw how successful he was, he was afraid of him. ¹⁶ But all Israel and Judah loved David, because he led them in their campaigns.

DIGGING IN:

¹⁶ "No!" she said to him. "Sending me away would be a greater wrong than what you have already done to me."

But he refused to listen to her. ¹⁷ He called his personal servant and said, "Get this woman out of my sight and bolt the door after her." ¹⁸ So his servant put her out and bolted the door after her. She was wearing an ornate robe, for this was the kind of garment the virgin daughters of the king wore. ¹⁹ Tamar put ashes on her head and tore the ornate robe she was wearing. She put her hands on her head and went away, weeping aloud as she went.

²⁰ Her brother Absalom said to her, "Has that Amnon, your brother, been with you? Be quiet for now, my sister; he is your brother. Don't take this thing to heart." And Tamar lived in her brother Absalom's house, a desolate woman.

²¹ When King David heard all this, he was furious. ²² And Absalom never said a word to Amnon, either good or bad; he hated Amnon because he had disgraced his sister Tamar.

DIGGING IN:

Day 1: 2 Samuel 15:1-4

In the course of time, Absalom provided himself with a chariot and horses and with fifty men to run ahead of him.² He would get up early and stand by the side of the road leading to the city gate. Whenever anyone came with a complaint to be placed before the king for a decision, Absalom would call out to him, "What town are you from?" He would answer, "Your servant is from one of the tribes of Israel." ³ Then Absalom would say to him, "Look, your claims are valid and proper, but there is no representative of the king to hear you." ⁴ And Absalom would add, "If only I were appointed judge in the land! Then everyone who has a complaint or case could come to me and I would see that they receive justice."

What is God saying to me in this passage?

They had been invited as guests and went quite innocently, knowing nothing about the matter. ¹² While Absalom was offering sacrifices, he also sent for Ahithophel the Gilonite, David's counselor, to come from Giloh, his hometown. And so the conspiracy gained strength, and Absalom's following kept on increasing.
